

## INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE PROGRAM WITH MUSASHI UNIVERSITY IN 2019

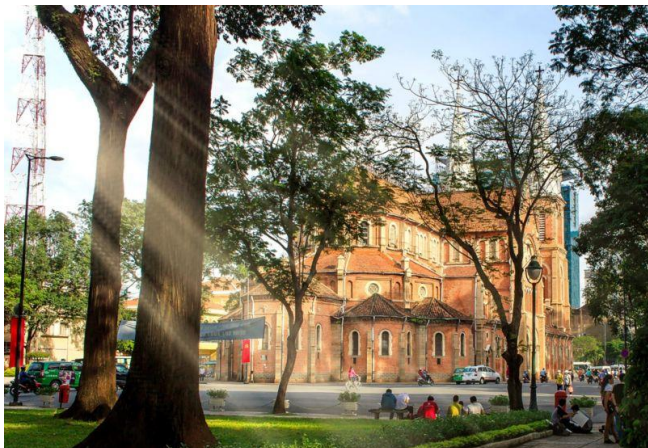
Musashi University (MU) was created in 1949 during the postwar reform of the education system. Before the reform, the university's predecessor, Musashi High School, established itself as an elite, seven-year educational institution. Founded in 1922, Musashi High School was the first seven-year high school in Japan, and its founder Kaichiro Nezu was the former president of Tobu Railway Company and a prominent business leader in the early 20th Century.

Recently partner with University of Economics Ho Chi Minh City (UEH) in 2018, but MU is willing to send students over for a 6 days' exchange program with UEH in Ho Chi Minh city. Throughout their 6 days' trip, MU students

and teachers get to visit famous historical places in the south of Vietnam such as Cu Chi Tunnel, Ho Chi Minh city tour including Saigon Notre Dame, Saigon Opera House, Nguyen Hue Street, War Remnants Museum, Reunification Hall. Moreover, the student also gets to visit Visit Yakult Co.Ltd.

**Saigon Notre Dame** built in the late 1880s and known as one of the iconic buildings of Ho Chi Minh city. With a beautiful landscaped and located in the heart of Saigon, Notre Dame Cathedral is one of the must-visit places in Ho Chi Minh.

Located at the intersection of Le Loi and Dong Khoi Street, **Saigon Opera House** is an elegant theater of Vietnam. Built-in 1897, Saigon Opera House with the capacity of 800 seats, this place is not only is used for staging not only opera but also a wide range of performing arts including ballet, musical concerts, Vietnamese traditional dance, and plays.

**Nguyen Hue Pedestrian Square** that is surrounded by beautiful French colonial architectural wonders like the People's Committee, the Rex Hotel, and a luxury shopping mall. From this place, the student can also get a view of Saigon River, Saigon's tallest building, Bitexco Financial Centre, etc.

The **War Remnants Museum** is Saigon's most visited museum. first opened to the public in 1975, it's a reminder of the long and brutal horrors of the Vietnam War from the victor's perspective. It's a must-see for anyone wanting to explore the horrors of the war. The museum displays a conventional bomb that weighs at 6,800 kg, helicopter with rocket launchers, a tank, a fighter plane, and a single-seat attack aircraft.

**Reunification Hall** is also known as the Independence Palace was the base of Vietnamese General Ngo Dinh Diem until his death in 1963. It is listed as a historical monument by witnessing great changes in Ho Chi Minh City's history and having in itself the essence of Eastern culture.

**Cu Chi Tunnels** are part of a massive war museum in Ho Chi Minh. They offer visitors a sneak-peek at the underground life of Vietnamese soldiers back in 1948 with 120km of underground tunnels, with trapdoors, living areas, kitchens, storage facilities, armory, hospitals, and command centers. It is now one of Ho Chi Minh's most iconic attractions. There are many activities that the students can join, a popular option is following the narrow routes of the underground tunnel.
