In October 2018, OSU's students experienced 13 days exchange program in Ho Chi Minh city, Vietnam organized by EUH. The students get to visit famous and historical places in Ho Chi Minh city, such as Saigon Notre Dame, Saigon Opera House, Nguyen Hue Street, War Remnants Museum, Reunification Hall and Visit Cu Chi Tunnels.

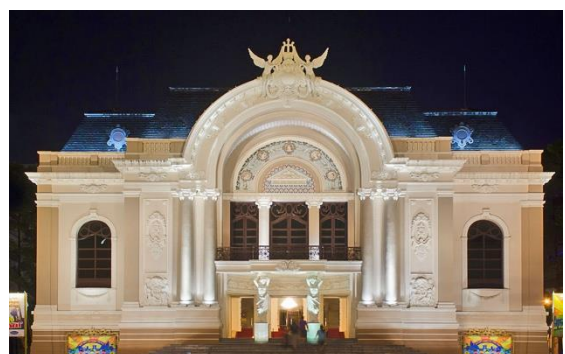


Saigon Notre Dame built in the late 1880s by French colonists. Located in Paris Square, In 1959, the name Notre Dame was given after the installation of the statue 'Peaceful Notre Dame'.

With a unique landscaped, Notre Dam Cathedral known as one of the few remaining strongholds of Catholicism in Vietnam.

Saigon Opera House is an elegant colonial building at the intersection of Le Loi and Dong Khoi Street in District 1, walking distance from the famous Notre Dame Cathedral and the classic Central Post Office. The theatre is over 120 years old with three story 800-seat Opera House is used for staging not only opera but also a wide range of performing arts including ballet, musical concerts, Vietnamese traditional dance and plays.

Nguyen Hue Street is a pedestrian square in the middle of the city center. This pedestrian area is flanked by some beautiful French colonial architectural wonders like the People's Committee, the Rex Hotel and a luxury shopping mall. In front of the People's Committee you find a statue of Uncle Ho Chi Minh and a fountain show by night.

War Remnants Museum in Ho Chi Minh City first opened to the public in 1975. Once known as the 'Museum of American War Crimes', it's a reminder of the long and brutal Vietnam War. Graphic photographs and American military equipment are on display. There's a helicopter with rocket launchers, a tank, a fighter plane, a single-seat attack aircraft. The museum also displays a conventional bomb that weighs at 6,800 kg. American troops had used these weapons against the Vietnamese during the time 1945 and 1975.

Reunification Hall was the base of Vietnamese General Ngo Dinh Diem until his death in 1963. It made its name in global history in 1975. A tank belonging to the North Vietnamese Army crashed through its main gate, ending the Vietnam War.

Visit Cu Chi Tunnels are part of a massive war museum in Ho Chi Minh. They offer visitors a sneak-peek at the underground life of Vietnamese soldiers back in 1948. The site has over 120km of underground tunnels, with trapdoors, living areas, kitchens, storage facilities, armory, hospitals, and command centers. After the war against the French, Vietnamese soldiers expanded the tunnels and included effective air filtration systems, which helped them survive the Chu Chi carpet-bombings. It is now one of Ho Chi Minh's most iconic attractions. There are many activities that the students can join, a popular option is following the narrow routes of the underground tunnel. Before entering the underground tunnels, the students get to watch a short film of Chu Chi Tunnels so that they understand how the tunnel system works. Parts of Chu Chi Tunnels are also cemented and widened, so that the crawl is less harrowing than it would have been in the past.



Throughout their stay in Ho Chi Minh city, EUH has designed a schedule where the OSU student gets to learn and experience at the same time. We give the exchange students learning sessions and academic seminars with different professors, and teachers from the EUH to learn about how the economy changes through time, how geography, agriculture affects the economy of Vietnam, and even Vietnamese language.

After 13 days exchange program, UEH has been receiving positive feedbacks from OSU students and delegates, on how the Vietnam Study Program has given practical experiences, relevant business content from both academics and practitioners.
